ETHNIC STUDIES

ETS-1 Introduction to Ethnic Studies

Prerequisite: None. Description: An introduction to the academic discipline of Ethnic Studies. Ethnic Studies is unique as an educational experience that defines and redefines the lives of people of color from their own perspectives. This course is an intersectional investigation that focuses on the histories, cultures and experiences of African Americans, Latinx peoples, Asian American and Pacific Islander, Indigenous peoples of America, and Middle Eastern and Arab American. Additionally, this course shall explore the work of key theorists of race, ethnicity, de-colonization and futurity whose work and ideas have formed the basis of the discipline. This course is in dialogue with the creative historical work of social movements, cultural and artistic productions, legal and public policy activists, indigenous and liberationist epistemologies, community and identity formation, and radical social and political thought. This course emphasizes ideologies of resistance, persistence, liberation struggle, and radical knowledge production that both confront and transform oppressive conditions and create new possibilities for social change. 54 hours lecture.
